The COVID-19 global pandemic has laid bare so many inequities that exist in our society. At Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center (ZSFG), we have seen a virus that spreads without prejudice but hospitalizes those most vulnerable. While our entire world focused on this new threat, lifesaving care continued—and our healthcare heroes adapted.

When in-person visits at ZSFG became dangerous for patients and providers, the hospital grew its telehealth system. Pop-up pantries helped families put food on the table. Substance use disorder programs moved counseling and treatment to mobile outdoor clinics.

COVID-19 has added a complicated layer to all of our lives. But for those who rely on ZSFG for their health and well-being, they knew they could count on our providers to continue delivering the best care.

COVID + FOOD INSECURITY



COVID-19 seemed to hit overnight. So many of the families served by ZSFG lost jobs, housing, and access to social safety-net programs that kept their families safe—like putting food on the table. Our providers asked their patients what they needed most. Over and over, they heard: help with rent, food, and diapers. And many asked themselves—what can I do to help *right now*?

For Dr. Misa Perron-Burdick, that meant turning her garage into a diaper warehouse. "I just had this image of our pregnant moms and moms with newborns going from store to store trying to find goods for their family, and putting themselves at increased risk," said Perron-Burdick, the Medical Director of the Women's Health Center. This concern grew into the Patient Pantry.

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The Patient Pantry program at ZSFG has grown to include 10 clinical sites—providing families access to much-needed food and supplies to take home after a visit to our clinics. The pantries are filled with culturally appropriate food, including fresh produce, as well as supplies like hand sanitizer, toilet paper, diapers, and baby wipes. And for those with needs between visits, a group of doctors, nurses, and medical students have been volunteering their time to gather supplies and make deliveries to nearly 50 families each month.

Organizations like the San Francisco-Marin Food Bank and the San Francisco Unified School District have stepped up to feed our city in heroic numbers. And because of these distribution sites, patients have somewhere to turn, even during a pandemic. The team behind these Patient Pantries hopes to give patients yet another place to find support.

The program continues to grow thanks to a new partnership with Solid Start—a multi-disciplinary effort at ZSFG focused on pregnant individuals and families with young children in San Francisco. One of our community partners, the Homeless Prenatal Program, is now housing the central pantry in their nearby facility.

And thanks to the recent 2020 Hearts Grants awarded by the Foundation, even more patients will have access to these health essentials during future visits.

COVID + CLIMATE CHANGE



On September 9th, the Bay Area awoke to an orange-tinted sky. With weeks of poor air quality, the argument for taking immediate action to mitigate climate change became unavoidable. Many of us stayed indoors that day, but the providers at ZSFG were at work, treating patients and calming fears.

For Kimberlee Honda, RN, Clinical Director of the Pediatric Asthma/Allergy Clinic, her patients are among those most affected by smoke-filled days. Luckily, she and her team have been able to keep their clinic open throughout COVID-19. This has proven essential for caregivers concerned about protecting their children from harmful air days, the upcoming flu season, and a serious airborne virus.

Through frequent telehealth visits, clinic staff have built trust with families, advising when to stay at home, and helping to protect the nearly 800 patients they see each year.

The compounding effects of 2020 seem to be the new normal. With wildfire season growing each year, West Coast hospitals like ZSFG are forced to prepare for an influx of patients affected by smoke inhalation. This is leading to a movement to integrate climate change into healthcare and medical education. And at ZSFG, caring for patients on that orange-sky day placed urgency on the need for big systemic change.

Now, with flu season upon us, it is so important to combat this perfect storm of climate change and COVID-19– especially for our most vulnerable.
