# Hearts in SF Event Honors Health Care Heroes and Raises \$2M





The Foundation was thrilled to have more than 1,000 registered guests for the 2022 Hearts in SF Virtual Gala and to raise \$2 million to support San Francisco's beloved public hospital and only Level 1 trauma center!

Hosted by KQED's Priya David Clemens live from Oracle Park, this year's virtual celebration was broadcast to homes across the Bay Area and beyond, honoring our health care heroes and raising critical funds for Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital (ZSFG).

Guests heard from leading doctors, including Heroes & Hearts Award winners Geoffrey Manley, Neil R. Powe, and Malini K. Singh, and the Unsung Heroes awardees at the hospital, including the Environmental Services unit (Sarah Lew and Francisco Saenz); the Facilities Services unit (Greg Chase, Alexander Quinn, and AJ Singh); the Sojourn Chaplaincy and Spiritual Care Department (including Claire Bohman and Monica Moore); and ZSFG's Med-Surg nurses, represented by Terry Dentoni and Chinelo Amah.

Dr. Priscilla Chan, in an open and heartfelt conversation with SFGHF's CEO Kim Meredith, inspired all to invest in public health as she shared her personal experience as a child of immigrants and what motivated her to become a physician. Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Mayor London Breed also spoke about the invaluable role that ZSFG plays in supporting the health and well-being of the San Francisco community. Dr. Sam Hawgood, Chancellor of the University of California,

San Francisco, Dr. Susan Ehrlich, CEO at ZSFG, and SFGHF Lifetime Board Director Judy Guggenhime helped celebrate the legacy of Dr. Sue Carlisle, who is retiring as the Vice Dean of the UCSF School of Medicine at ZSFG later this year.

The \$2 million raised through Hearts in SF 2022 surpassed the fundraising total from last year's event, in large part thanks to our generous lead sponsors, including Presenting Sponsor Enlight Foundation; Principal Sponsor Bank of America; Platinum Sponsors Steven and Diana Strandberg, California Health Care Foundation, and UCSF; Gold Sponsors BMO Financial Group, the Stanley S. #### A Tribute to Nancy Bechtle



The Foundation family was saddened to learn of the passing of Nancy Bechtle, a longtime supporter of the Foundation and the heart and soul behind Hearts in San Francisco.

A consummate supporter of the arts and a pillar of the philanthropic community in San Francisco, Nancy found new ways to raise funds for vital programming in her hometown. In 2002, Nancy was asked by friend Ellen Magnin Newman to join her in designing what would become the Hearts in San Francisco project.

Inspired by public art in Chicago, as well as Tony Bennett's signature song, "I Left My Heart in San Francisco," over the next two years Nancy and Ellen recruited 131 artists to design large heart sculptures that would decorate the city center and bring color and life to San Francisco. Raising \$3 million in its first year alone, Nancy's legacy lives on as the Hearts in San Francisco project celebrates its 18th year, having cumulatively raised an impressive \$12 million in support for the compassionate and innovative programs at ZSFG through the auction of more than 500 heart sculptures.

A fifth-generation San Franciscan, Nancy's multigenerational history with the city made this project extremely special to her. Nancy's leadership and participation created a lasting impact on the landscape of San Francisco.
