Justice Finds a Home in Bayview Hunters Point



The Foundation recently launched the <u>Community</u> <u>Hearts Program</u>, a new initiative that will bring Hearts in San Francisco sculptures to communities across San Francisco. The first installation of Community Hearts began this month thanks to a new partnership with the Southeast Community Center (SECC) in San Francisco's Bayview Hunters Point neighborhood. As part of the Black History Month celebration on February 24, the SECC unveiled André Renay's heart sculpture, <u>Justice</u>, which stood in Union Square for much of 2020 and celebrates the civil rights work of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and the Black Lives Matter movement of today.

Bringing an Equity Lens to Safety

The Foundation proudly invests in innovation, equity, and, especially, people at ZSFG. When a group of mental health professionals devised a better way of caring for the Hospital's patients, staff, and visitors, the Foundation was eager to support their work. The Behavioral Emergency Response Team (BERT) brings a novel approach to staff and patient safety, centered around mental and behavioral health expertise rather than law enforcement.

Late last year, the BERT team was recognized for its on-the-ground innovation, receiving the Equity Quality Leaders Award from the California Association of Public Hospitals and Health Systems. BERT teams are quickly becoming part of many major hospital systems' response to staff safety and health equity issues, and the ZSFG team is at the forefront of this health-first approach.
